Spellings This week we are going to focus on adding s or es to verbs.

Adding the endings -s and -es to verbs

- 1 Take turns to read the information with your partner.

Some types of verbs end in **-s**: sings plays eats
For example: He sings that song really well.

When you spell a verb with an **-s** or **-es** ending, think about how it sounds to help you decide which ending to use. If the verb ending sounds like **iz**, and the word has an extra syllable or 'beat', we use **-es**: catches passes closes

- 2 Add **-s** or **-es** to these verbs. (Think carefully about whether the endings sound like **z** or **iz**.) The first one has been done for you.






I can't wait to see what you've been up to! Thank you so much to those children who have sent me work already! It's lovely to keep in touch.
