How many words can you remember and explain?</p> <p>Turn to page 9 and check that the text about rainbows has all of the features of an explanation text, then follow one of the links, choose a topic that you are interested in and write down what you find.</p> <p>Example:</p> <div style="display: flex; align-items: flex-start;"> <div style="font-size: small; margin-right: 10px;"> <p>Woolly mammoth</p> <p>Majestic mammoths once roamed in herds across the ice age plains of North America, Europe and Asia. Mammoths were closely related to modern elephants. In fact, members of these mammals lived in the same area over 100,000 years before the end of the last ice age. About 10,000 years ago, the mammoth population collapsed. The last mammoth was shot in 1901. There were eight species of mammoths of which the most famous is the woolly mammoth, which died out only 3,700 years ago.</p> <p>The longest mammoth tusk found so far is 4m (13ft) in length.</p> </div>  </div> <p>Title: Woolly Mammoth Opening sentence: Majestic mammoths once roamed in herds across the ice plains of North America, Europe and Asia. Key fact: Studies show that their DNA was almost identical to elephants. Fascinating fact: The longest mammoth tusk is 4m! <i>The photograph is of a woolly mammoth, it has labels to help identify the different parts.</i></p> <p>Complete your review giving your opinions and reasons.</p> <p>Read the information on page 11 about your writing challenge. Write a list of things that you know a lot about. Then, plan your text using the examples to help you:</p>	<p>Read your plan. Make any changes that you want, if you are not quite happy with it. Think about who you want to write this for</p> <p>Remember: If they are younger than you remember that you will need to write in a way that they understand. If they are older than you, you will need to use your 'grown up' language. If you are writing for someone that you don't know, you will need to use formal language.</p> <p>Read page 13 before you write, so that you know what you need to do. Remember to use your plan to help you structure your writing.</p> <p>When you have written a rough draft of your explanation text, write it neatly. You could use your typing skills and write it on a computer, using images from KidRex to illustrate. If you are writing it by hand, remember to use neat handwriting and use coloured pencils for your images.</p>

Yoghurt and Cucumber Dip (Tzatziki and Raita)


Recipe info	Description
<p>Ingredients</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 1 cucumber 400g natural yoghurt 1 sprig of mint 1 lemon 2 tbs olive oil Sprinkle of paprika (optional) <p>Equipment</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Sharp knife Chopping board Mixing bowl Lemon squeezer Measuring spoons Mixing spoon Serving dish 	<p>Tzatziki is used in Middle Eastern and Mediterranean cuisines. Tzatziki is usually served as a dip with bread, such as pita, but in the Middle East it is more common as a side dish to a meal with meat.</p> <p>Method / What to do</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Wash cucumber, cut length-wise and scoop out the seeds, as these can make the tzatziki watery. Cut the cucumber into very small chunks. 2. Put the yoghurt and diced cucumber in a bowl. 3. Wash and chop the mint finely and add to the mixture. 4. Squeeze the lemon and measure out the lemon juice and olive oil. 5. Mix all ingredients in with yoghurt and leave to chill for 30 minutes. 6. Sprinkle with a little paprika powder before serving with some dippers such as pita or vegetable sticks.
